Text:

Mary Ann Evan, known by her pen-name George Eliot, was a famous English novelist, poet, journalist, translator and one of the leading writers of the Victorian Era. She was born on November 22nd, 1819 in Nuneaton, a large town in England.



George Eliot studied at Wallington Primary School and was voracious reader and obviously intelligent. As she grew up, she moved to London hoping to become a freelance writer. She worked as subeditor at The Westminster Review where she wrote many essays as well as short stories. In 1859, she published her first novel "Adam Bede". She also wrote numerous novels including "The Mill on the Floss" in 1860, "Silas Marner" in 1861, "Middlemarch" in 1871 and "Daniel Deronda" in 1876. The popularity of Eliot's novels brought social acceptance and were mainly appreciated for their descriptions of rural society. As a result, she obtained the Queen Victoria Literary Prize.

This great novelist died on December 22nd 1880 in Chelsea, London and her home became a meeting place for writers and intellectuals.

Assia Djébar

Fatima Zohra Imalayan, known by her pen-name Assia Djébar is a famous Algerian novelist, essayist, translator, professor and filmmaker. She was born on June 30th, 1936 in Cherchel. She is noticed for her feminist stance because most of her works deal with obstacles faced by women. She wrote different novels like "The Thirst" in 1957, "Children of the New World" in 1962 and "The Naïve Larks" in 1967. She also published over 15 books, short stories, poems and plays. For the entire body of her work, she was awarded the 1996 Neustadt International Prize for Literature. This pre-eminent writer died on February 6th, 2015 in Paris.
